Threat Overview

There were no terrorist attacks in Great Britain in August 2020. However, police did arrest several individuals in England and Northern Ireland on suspicion of preparation of terrorism acts. In Europe, a suspected Islamist extremist drove his car into several other vehicles near the centre of Berlin, injuring six people. This attack was unique amongst vehicular impact attacks as it was the first to target non-stationary individuals.

Further afield, Daesh-linked militants captured the port town of Mocimboa de Praia in northern Mozambique, located close to the region's major natural gas exploration projects. While this incident marks a major success for Daesh's local affiliate, Islamic State Central Africa Province (ISCAP), it is unlikely to galvanise support for the group internationally, in the manner that the group's success in Iraq did in 2014-16.

New IRA arrests on British mainland


On 22 August, police arrested Dr Issam Bassalat, a Scottish resident of Palestinian extraction, at Heathrow Airport on suspicion of preparation of terrorist acts. A further nine people were arrested in Northern Ireland as part of Operation Arbacia, an ongoing investigation into the New IRA. The charges against Bassalat relate to a meeting in County Tyrone in July where members of the New IRA were allegedly present.

Violent Dissident Republicans continue to demonstrate the intent to target the British mainland. However, their ability to do so is constrained by ongoing counter-terrorism operations and the limited reach of terrorist networks outside of Northern Ireland. While the arrest of Bassalat may point to a renewed effort by the New IRA to recruit agents outside the Province, it probably does not reflect a major change in the capabilities of the group, or its ability to conduct attacks in Great Britain.

Berlin motorway attack

On the evening of 18 August, an Iraqi refugee drove his car into several other vehicles on a motorway near the centre of Berlin, injuring six people. Police and local prosecutors have said that the attack was motivated by Islamist extremism, although prosecutors indicated the attacker also suffered from psychological issues.

Germany has experienced several high-profile Islamist attacks over the last five years, including vehicular impact attacks. Requiring little preparation or know-how, the methodology has been favoured by terrorists with limited tradecraft and few resources. Traditionally, the tactic has been used against pedestrians and stationary targets. This is the first time an attacker has targeted other vehicles on the road.

Since a spate of lethal vehicular impact attacks in 2016, authorities in Europe have protected crowded places against the threat using hostile vehicle mitigation (HVM) measures. It is unclear if the unusual target selection of the attacker was in response to the hardening of other potential targets with HVM, or whether it was motivated by other factors. Regardless, vehicles provide their occupants with a measure of protection, so future vehicular impact attacks are likely to continue to target more vulnerable stationary targets.

Brother of Manchester Arena bomber jailed for 55 years

Hashem Abedi, the brother of the Manchester Arena bomber Salman Abedi, was jailed for 55 years on Thursday, 20 August. Hashem Abedi assisted his brother in the planning of the bombing in May 2017. This is the longest determinate prison term handed down in British history. As Hashem Abedi was under 21 at the time of the attack, the law prohibits the imposition of a whole life order (a life sentence with no minimum term).

This sentencing shows the willingness of the British judicial system to impose stringent sentences against those convicted of preparing acts of terrorism. This sentence follows several new pieces of legislation that came into effect in the last nine months, following high-profile attacks in London Bridge and Streatham, where the attackers had been recently released early from prison, despite being convicted of terrorism charges. Terrorism offenders are now ineligible for automatic release and cases must be reviewed on an individual basis by a risk committee.

Daesh seize key port in northern Mozambique



Daesh-aligned militants captured the port town of Mocimboa de Praia in Cabo Delgado Province, northern Mozambique on 12 August. The town is near some of Africa's largest natural gas projects. Islamist extremists have been active in the region since at least 2015 and have effectively exploited local grievances to make gains in the region, with attacks against security forces increasingly common from 2017. In June 2019, Daesh's official media outlets claimed an attack in the country under the banner of Islamic State Central Africa Province (ISCAP), and elements of the insurgency have publicly pledged allegiance to the group.

While the capture of the Mocimboa de Praia represents a major success for the insurgency, it is unlikely to galvanise international support for Daesh in the manner that the group's success in Iraq did in 2014-16. Despite significant gas finds, the region is isolated, sparsely populated, and is devoid of the symbolic significance of other areas captured by Islamist groups in recent years. While the Mozambican Government's counter-terrorism efforts have been lacklustre, the insurgency is unlikely to be able to hold significant territory in the event of an intervention by regional or international security forces.
